Year ended 31 March 2023

The trustees, who are also the directors for the purposes of company law, present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Chair's report

This was the first full operational year after the COVID 19 pandemic and as our SRCDC community continued to emerge from it, we were faced with the cost-of-living crisis that has again impacted greatly on peoples' finances. We have made efforts to help those who were impacted most from soaring energy bills.

The demand for membership of the Wyndham Street Pantry has increased and new sources of food donations have had to be found to meet demand as the supplies from FareShare Cymru have decreased. A variety of small grants from C3SC helped us to offer halal food and top up the pantry fruit and vegetable offers and supply a range of different activities to invite the community into the buildings to keep warm and reduce isolation. The Pantry volunteers got involved with new activities such as planting vegetables in local parks that later became available for picking by local residents.

Our partnership with FoodCycle continues to support our efforts to ease food poverty, loneliness and food waste for our community, by providing delicious three course meals and great conversation each Wednesday night, whilst using food which would otherwise go to waste.

We have secured a continuation funding for our anti-poverty programme Credu/Believe for another three years to provide employment and training support to women from ethnic minority communities. We organized a wonderful celebration of the women's achievements at the Wales Principality Stadium for International Women's Day. The Credu/Believe spin off project Let's Interpret continues to increase numbers of trained and qualified interpreters.

Through the Youth Innovation Project, the Young Children's and Parents Project and our Parent and Toddler group, we continue to make positive impact providing a diverse and inclusive range of programmes and activities. Our commitment is to address their needs, promoting personal growth and fostering a sense of community.

Funded by the Arts Council of Wales, the River Music project continues to grow strong, providing opportunities for children, young people, and families to participate in arts activities with 45 children per week benefitting from their music art and drama classes. They showcased the inspiring artistic talent of Riverside at St Davids Hall's 40th celebration.

The project organised day trips for local families who had a wonderful time visiting the Sea Monster environmental Arts installation in Weston Super Mare and the Roman Baths in Bath. The River Music project curated and performed at the Riverside Festival, our annual joyful community event that is becoming more and more inclusive and representative of all of the communities in Riverside.

One of our notable achievements this year was the renovation of one of our treasured community buildings. Locally known as the Riverside Warehouse, this building has been transformed into a modern, light, airy building providing a multi-functional resource for the community for many years to come.

I am delighted to report that SRCDC has had such a successful year and we continued to respond to urgent developments by developing new projects and maintaining our core programmes. We've achieved so much together in this financial year. We are very aware of the significant challenges facing our community and we will do everything we can to ensure that all of our brilliant community's resources are mobilised to support people through these times.

I am grateful for the hard work of all the staff, including the childcare providers, cleaners, volunteers, youth workers, project leaders, directors and trustees.

Achievements and performance

Believe/Credu 1 (funded by Henry Smith)

The Project has been providing employment and training support to women from ethnic minority communities that are over 25 years of age in our area of benefit. It was funded until May 2022. However, due to the disruption from the Covid 19 pandemic an extension was negotiated until the end of August 2022.

The Project has partnered with a number of agencies to overcome challenges such as transport, language and work experience. The project has facilitated cycling lessons, cooking pop-ups, ready steady cook demonstrations (Zoom/Online), read and write classes, sewing classes and training for Interpreters.

The Project achieved most of its outcomes by August 2022 and a final project report is available. Having successfully achieved most of the outcomes for the 3 years of funding the Funder, Henry Smith agreed to fund a subsequent 3 years which resulted in an additional phase called Believe/Credu 2 starting from January 2023.

Believe/Credu 2 (funded by Henry Smith)

The Project successfully recruited the majority of its target participants by the end of March 2023 and many women coming through the door were asking for support with English language development and reading and writing.

A celebration of the women's achievement was facilitated at the Wales Principality Stadium for International Women's Day and this helped the women reflect on their personal development, distance travelled and increased confidence. During the event they presented in front of a large audience in their second language.

The Project is developing from strength to strength and offering; Get cooking classes, Read and Write sessions, sewing, craft, digital literacy and a weekly Friends and Neighbours (FAN) Group.

C3SC - Move More Eat Well

Through this project four participants were recruited from the community to train to become Lowland Walk Leaders and attended the two day lowland Walk Leader course with Partneriaeth Awyr Agored and Cardiff Council. In addition one of the participants attended and passed a two day Rescue Emergency Care certificate. Some walks have been trialled with a view of taking out regular groups on a monthly basis to encourage women from the diverse community of Riverside to take part in outdoor recreational activity.

Moneywise (funded by C3SC)

A grant was successfully secured from the C3SC Employability Grant to support and enable women to come together in a safe space to learn how to tell the time and activities around budgeting and shopping. This also helped sign-post participants to other learning opportunities provided by Believe/Credu and also the Food Pantry.

Let's Interpret

During the period of April 2022-March 2023, Let's Interpret was funded firstly by National Lottery funding via the 'We Can Work It Out' Project and then by the Prince of Wales Charitable Trust and the

National Lottery "Awards for All". During this period we recruited a further 20 trainee interpreters, all of whom successfully completed an accredited level 3 course in Public Service Interpreting. Additional continuing professional development (CPD) training was also delivered on topics including; safeguarding, equality and diversity awareness, mental health awareness, confidence building and vicarious trauma. These were attended by our existing members as well as the new recruits, and a number of members benefitted from work experience secured with 5 local third sector organisations. In February 2023 we also began delivering bi-monthly supervision sessions for those of our members who have started working as volunteer or paid interpreters.

Youth Innovation Project (funded by Cardiff Council, Youth Services

The Youth Innovation Project is delivered to the young people of Riverside and Grangetown and provides a comprehensive universal open access provision. The project operates on a weekly basis across the localities and creates opportunities for young people to engage in purposeful activities that encourage participation, social skills, nurtures potential and creates a platform to highlight achievements. The project continues to make a positive impact on the lives of young people by providing a diverse and inclusive range of programmes and activities. Our commitment is to addressing their needs, promoting personal growth, and fostering a sense of community. This focus and approach is evident throughout our work.

Young Children's and Parents Project (YCPP)

The YCPP works with children aged 0 to 14 year's old providing childcare and play along with a variety of activities such as arts & craft, sporting sessions and some cultural activities.

Parent & Toddler group (funded by BBC Children in Need)

Delivered by YCCP the session runs every Monday and Thursday mornings during term time for babies and children under 5 years old. We have had up to 10 families attending where parent stay and play with their children while staff chart the development of the children who attend. We also provide activities for children and young people aged 7 to 14 during the half terms and summer holidays, where we have up to 30 disadvantaged children attending.

Mobile Crèche

The YCPP also runs a Mobile Crèche enterprise, providing childcare for parent who are attending various classes provided by other organisations. We have regularly provided childcare for the NHS dietetics team, the Red Cross, Oasis, and the Home Office Boarder Agency among others.

This year the YCPP had some funding from Street Games. With this the children and young people were able to experience and take part in different sporting activities. They took part in learning horse riding, badminton, and table tennis. We had 11 children attending

Wyndham Street Pantry

The Wyndham Street Pantry provides a twice weekly (Tuesday 1pm-6pm & Wednesday 10am - 2pm) opportunity for local residents on low incomes to access up to £25.00 worth of food shopping for £5.00 (food products vary on a weekly basis). The pantry collaborates with a range of suppliers including FareShare Cymru to respond to food poverty challenges facing residents and the reduction of food waste through the process. The pantry numbers continue to grow as the cost of food in local supermarkets continue to increase. The pantry has turned around our food hygiene rating that has increased from a rating of 1 (v. poor) to 4 (good) The next inspection is March 2025 and the aim is for a 5 rating.

The pantry joined the steering group of Riverside Greening Project and planted vegetables in local parks which were available for picking by local residents. We launched 'Plant a Row Allotments' project with 15 allotments pledging vegetables to the pantry. Insole court allotment dedicated an overgrown plot to the pantry and we arranged volunteers from the home office to make it planting ready.

We would like to recognise and celebrate the massive investment in time and effort of our dedicated and valued volunteers who source food on a weekly basis from various suppliers including Costco, Lidl, Aldi, Alex Gooch/Brod bakeries and individual shop donations. This year we received a £150 donation from the Riverside Market for dried food supplies.

C3SC Food Poverty Grant

This additional funding was used to purchase halal food/meat, we hosted a Ramadan breakfast and provided some special foods e.g. watermelon. This funding also topped up the pantry fruit and vegetable offer.

River Music

This period saw the successful completion of our Arts Council of Wales funded project "River Arts at SRCDC" giving opportunities for children, young people and family participation. We worked with 1750 participants and offered 567 activities. Activities offered included wheel pottery, UV light prop and costume making with Hummadruz, banner making, animation, circus skills (with No Fit State), drumming, screen printing (with Print Haus), Welsh speaking Art and music workshops (with Mentor Caerdydd), weekly Ukulele and piano classes, modern dance/ballet (with Ballet Cymru) and the development of a young person's drama group. We worked with Umbrella Arts Collective around understanding artistic processes, leading to young people sharing a gallery space with established artists. We took large groups of children with family members to the Sea Monster environmental Arts installation in Weston Super Mare and a visit to the Roman Baths.

We staged a series of after school music sessions in Kitchener Rd. Primary School including Djembe, Bollywood and traditional Hindustani folk singing and tabla drumming workshops. All reflecting the cultural mix of the pupils and facilitators largely from with our own communities in Riverside.

The musical side of the project continued the development of professional, semi professional artists and beginners of all ages and through our endeavours provided recorded output, some of which has contributed to River providing 3 songs from Arabic, Mandinka and Hindi to the Welsh school curriculum. The recordings will also contribute to the eventual release of a PRS funded EP that River are currently completing. An extension of the project supported more live River performances at St Davids Hall's 40th celebration (where we took over an entire floor of the building!) and a performance at Wales Millennium Centre.

We were also fortunate enough to be able to curate and perform at the Riverside Festival, which is a yearly community event that is becoming more and more inclusive and representative of all the communities in Riverside. We held 4 Raga workshops to study Hindustani Classical form and we took African road trips to Cwmbran and Pontypool and Pontypridd. We are very grateful to Arts Council Wales for this support enabling us to continue our work.

Since August 2022 we have also been in receipt of Atsain Youth Music funding to support young people in the area, helping to further sustain Ukulele, piano, drama and arts classes for young people with 45 children per week benefit from these classes and holding sound technology sessions at the Youth club.

C3SC - Warm Spaces & Social Isolation

With these grants we were able to offer a range of different activities to invite the community into the buildings to keep warm and reduce isolation. We ran Salsa sessions, Homework Club and revision sessions, Art Club and a Cuppa and Chat sessions.

Riverside Warehouse Renovation (funded by Welsh Government, Community Facilities Grant and various partners)

The community building known locally as the Riverside Warehouse has been transformed into a modern, light, airy building to make it into a multi-functional resource for the community. This was funded primarily by the Welsh Government through the Community Facilities Grant and a range of funders and partners including; B&Q, Street Games Moondance and Taff Housing and we are very appreciative of this support.

Willis Construction undertook the renovation from January- April 2023 and a huge thank you to Willis Construction, as they fund-raised for a defibrillator to be placed outside the Warehouse for the community of Riverside. The building was officially re-opened on Friday 22nd September 2023 by the First Minister of Wales, Mark Drakeford Ms and attended by over 100 community members and partner organisations.

This building moving forward will be available for hire for private functions, ESOL classes, cooking and sewing workshops, meetings and celebration events.

Financial review

The charity has continued to develop it financial policies and management during 2022-23. South Riverside Community Development Centre received various sources of income during the year including £300,000 from Welsh Government to refurbish The Warehouse in Machen Place. It will continue to build on its strategic policy of developing and improving the diversity of its income streams.

The charity conducts its core activities from its main building in Brunel Street, a freehold building which it owns. The Wyndham Street Centre and The Warehouse are both leased from Cardiff Council.

The charity is reporting a surplus of £329,835 for the year ending 31 March 23 compared to a deficit of £57,539 for the previous year.

Warehouse Refurbishment Fund

Included in restricted income is £336,668 received for funding towards building improvements to the warehouse:

Welsh Government	£300,000
Street Games	£10,000
Moondance	£20,000
B&Q	£6,668

The expenditure relating to the building improvement's funding totalling £303,960 has been capitalised in the Statement of Financial Position. The building can be used for the Charity's general activity, the restriction has been satisfied upon full expenditure and completion of the project, therefore the fund has been transferred to an unrestricted designated building improvements fund as at the year end.

Unrestricted Funds

The total unrestricted funds at the year-end amount to £453,833 (2022 - £109,029).

This is split between general unrestricted funds of £104,705 representing the Charity's free reserve, a general Pantry fund of £1247, a designated general building improvement fund of £50,000 and an unrestricted designated warehouse refurbishment fund of £297,881, representing the Historic Net Book Value of restricted capital expenditure on building improvements to the warehouse. Please refer to note 20 of the financial statements.

Reserves Policy

The charity holds £757,723 in reserves compared to £427,887 in the previous year. The reserves are classified as £453,833 unrestricted and £303,890 restricted. It is the policy of South Riverside Community Development Centre to hold sufficient reserves to cover at least 6 months operational costs plus potential redundancy costs.

The charity has calculated the unrestricted reserves target as £54,861, therefore the unrestricted reserves of £453,833 are currently sufficient. Officers and Trustees will continue to review and monitor the reserves target and levels.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2023

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is South Riverside Community Centre, Brunel Street, Riverside, Cardiff, CF11 6ES.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Tangible assets (continued)

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

2% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost includes all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the charity will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Government grants (continued)

Where the grant does not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income when the grant proceeds are received or receivable. Where the grant does impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions have been met. Where grants received are prior to satisfying the revenue recognition criteria, they are recognised as a liability.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted. Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. The liability of the members in the event of the company being liquidated is limited to £1 per member.
